But in regulated performances the zurnaci-tapanci formations have been active participants in informal events that occurred spontaneously at folklore sabors and festivals. After the official stage programs the zurnacies are commissioned to play on the clearings and on the way, in the camps by the fire and in the taverns. At the sabors in Koprivshtitsa we have seen many foreigners, who like Bulgarian music and dance folklore, to pay the zurnaci bands in order to play the dances. Often in such cases during the night foreigners and Bulgarians have been crowding the horos, danced with the accompaniment of zurnas for hours.

One can witness a real competition between the zurnaci bands during the Pirin Pee festival. Besides the formal presentations of the participants, the zurnacies are commissioned by the men merrymaking in the improvised tent-inns in order to play for them table music. In 2001 while making the recordings in the Predela we recorded a similar situation in a pavilion located not far from the stages. Drunken men forbade us to record the zurnacies since they had paid them to play: "Don't explain. It's me the boss. Who are you to explain? Who's paying?" The two zurnacies Kurtata and Vancho with a tapanci from Petrich stopped speaking to us and played non-stop for half and hour. In the music potpourri they played one could recognize the popular for this region song images. intonations and motifs like More, sokol pie, Bolen mi lezhi Mile Popjordanov, etc. Later a band from Razlog also came to the place. Their music consisted of instrumental versions of local songs and zurnacies' variants of the song Partizan za boy se stjaga which used to be popular during the socialist period. Provoked by the virtuous and artistic tapanci Emil and the zurnacies who were playing in accelerating tempos, the drinking men got up and began to dance. Their feast lasted for hours. Meanwhile other zurnacies were playing in other pavilions and tents. At that time the official program of the folklore sabor was going on.

The zurnaci-tapanci formations participate with masked groups from Southwest Bulgaria in the festivals of carnivals and masked plays in Pernik. This festival has been held as a regional event since the 1970s. In the 1990s it became an international one. The informants from Razlog who have been to the festival in Pernik say that their band "is the most impressive with the great number of participant 120 or 130 people at least". The presentation of the band from Razlog is lead by a man dressed in a national costume carrying a slogan with the name of the town and dolls chaush-es. Then come the participants in the masquerade plays: chaush-es in goat skins, lasses and lads in folk costumes, who circle horos around the zurnacies. The zurnacies who have been accompanying constantly the local masked detachment belong to the Zangovs family.

Razlog zurnacies accompany the local amateur band presenting masked plays at international festivals abroad. The Zangovs have been to carnivals in France, Denmark, Slovenia.

The zurnas have become a part of the Roma folklorism as well. In 2001 a festive procession of the participants in the town streets was organized for the first time at the 9<sup>th</sup> Festival of Roma Music and Dances – Romafest held in Stara Zagora. The long column of dancers, musicians and singers from Bulgaria, India, Serbia and Macedonia was lead by a zurnaci formation from Razlog. This band was accompanying the dance ensemble Bahtalo Roma.
